Four WKU American Humanics students were recently selected to receive non-profit internship stipends from the Next Generation Nonprofit Leaders Program (NextGen), an American Humanics initiative funded through the Kellogg Foundation. This national honor provides a \$4,500 stipend for support during participation in the internship required for the AH national certification and the WKU American Humanics (Nonprofit Administration) minor. **Jenna Doughman, Annie Farris, Evelyn Oregon, and Sara Miller** were selected from a national group of students applying for this program.

**William Pfohl** (Psychology) was recently elected president of the International School Psychology Association. Pfohl had previously served two terms as president of the National Association of School Psychologists. He will serve as ISPA president-elect from 2007-09 and as president from 2009-11. ISPA represents school psychology associations worldwide and has members in 40 countries on six continents.

This spring, the WKU Forensic Team was once again crowned National Champion at the American Forensics Association national tournament. WKU took the top prize by 84 points--the largest ever margin of victory. WKU also won the coveted Individual Sweepstakes championship. Senior **Lydia Nelson** defeated the entire field of competitors to defeat junior (and last year's Individual Sweepstakes champion) **Natalie Sintek** – the first time any team has ever won the top two spots. Congratulations!

**Barbara Burch, WKU's Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, has received the William M. Plater Award for Leadership in Civic Engagement, presented by the Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU). This is the first national award established specifically to honor and recognize chief academic officers for their critical role in advancing the civic mission of the campus. Congratulations!**

Three WKU Honors students have received prestigious national scholarships for the fall 2007 semester. **Ashley Belcher** and **Angie Piper** have received Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarships, while **Derek R. Gaboriault** has received a Freeman-ASIA Award. Belcher, a Spanish major, will spend the fall semester in Spain. Piper, a psychology major, will study in China. Gaboriault, a theatre major, will travel to Vietnam this fall and has spent most of this summer at the

University of Wisconsin-Madison studying Vietnamese at the Southeast Asian Summer Study Institute.

WKU's student chapter of the Society for Human Resource Management (SHRM) was recognized as one of the 2006-2007 Top Ten Student Chapters at the SHRM Annual Student Conference in June in Las Vegas – the highest award that a chapter can receive. Congratulations to chapter president **Brentni Henderson** and team!

Two WKU Geographic Information Science (GIS) students received scholarships to participate in the 27th Annual Environmental Systems Research Institute (ESRI) International User Conference in San Diego in June. **Ronnie Leeper**, a graduate geoscience student, and **Brandon Fowler**, an undergraduate computer information systems major and GIS minor, were selected from a pool of international applicants for the competitive scholarships. Each year, ESRI hosts a conference for GIS users to share ideas and gain knowledge about GIS technology, and this is the sixth year in a row that a WKU student has been

selected for a scholarship. Geography and Geology faculty **Kevin Cary** and **Yanmei Li** accompanied the students.

**Sally Kuhlenschmidt**, director of WKU's Faculty Center for Excellence in Teaching, was recognized in May by the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education for her leadership and invaluable contributions to the development of Kentucky's postsecondary faculty through her tireless support of the Kentucky Conference on the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning.

WKU senior **Jonathan D. Woods** finished third in the Hearst Journalism Awards Programs' National Photojournalism Championships. Woods, one of two WKU photojournalists who competed in June in San Francisco, received a \$3,000 award.

December graduate **Edward Linsmier** was a runner-up in the national finals and received a \$1,500 award. Senior **McKenzie York** was a runner-up in television news finals in the National Broadcast News Championships and received a \$1,500 award. Photojournalism students **Carl Kiilsgaard** and **Christian Hansen** received \$1,000 awards as national semifinalists. **WKU's School of Journalism and Broadcasting** placed fourth overall this year, the school's ninth consecutive top four finish in the national competition, and has won 16 times in the past 18 years.

**Carol Wilkerson (Modern Languages) was appointed by the Board of Directors of the Southern Conference On Language Teaching to serve as co-editor of the 2007-2008 edition of its journal, Dimension. She will assume full responsibilities as editor beginning in 2008.**

**Elizabeth Winkler** (English) recently published a textbook, *Understanding Language: A Basic Course in Linguistics*.

WKU students spent 12 days in Costa Rica as part of a May term course on service learning, ecotourism and outdoor recreation. The course provided opportunities to traverse rainforests, work with local community organizations, and participate in conservation and environmental studies. The students also participated in a volunteer project to work on a trail at Tenorio National Park. **Tyler Spencer, Beth Weimer, Ryan Nethery, Michelle Riggs,** and **Ed Rogers** participated in this class, accompanied by **Ron Ramsing** (Recreation Administration) and **Luke Bartlett**, coordinator of WKU's Outdoor Recreation Adventure Center.

Matching its best finish ever, WKU's "Rocked Out" finished in fourth-place overall in the 20th annual National Concrete Canoe Competition. The competition, held in June in Seattle, featured students from 22 of the nation's top engineering schools. WKU posted its seventh top-10 finish in the past eight years, and advanced to the national competition by winning its 12th consecutive Ohio Valley regional title.
