WKU's Theatre program has just been accredited by NAST – the National Association of Schools of Theatre. This makes WKU the only university in the state with its arts, music, and theatre programs all accredited. Congratulations to Scott Stroot and crew!

Two WKU students have been named as recipients of prestigious Barry M. Goldwater Scholarships, and another has received honorable mention. Mark Sandefur and Joseph Chavarria-Smith were selected as scholars. Mark is a junior biology/chemistry double major, while Joseph is a sophomore recombinant gene technology/chemistry double major. They were two of 317 students chosen nationally. Only five Kentucky residents received awards this year; only three of those are attending Kentucky schools. R. Reagan Gilley was selected for an honorable mention award. He is

a sophomore biology/chemistry double major; and will be eligible to re-apply for the award next year. This is truly an outstanding showing for WKU!

The Kentucky Music Educators Association (KMEA) honored WKU **Music** faculty and alumni at the annual KMEA In-Service Professional Development Conference in Louisville in February. The honorees were: **Sheila Smalling**, WKU '85 & '89 alum, Middle School Teacher of the Year. **Smalling** is currently the Band Director at Drakes Creek Middle School in Bowling Green. **John Cipolla**, Music Faculty member since 2002, College/University Teacher of the Year. **Cipolla** has recently issued a jazz CD, in collaboration with David Livingston, entitled – *Misbehavin'*. **Lisa Hussung**, part-time Music faculty member since 2002, Elementary School Teacher of the Year. **Hussung** currently is the Music Specialist at Rich Pond Elementary School.

WKU also made a great showing in this year's Fulbright grant competition. Paul Love, a History and Religious Studies double major, was awarded a Fulbright Grant to study in Egypt for the 2007-2008 academic year. He previously earned the U.S. State Department Critical Language scholarship to study Arabic in Tunisia last summer. Katherine Hale also is a finalist and is still in contention for a grant to study in Chile. Congratulations!

WKU's **Students In Free Enterprise (SIFE)** team is regional champion for the third year in a row. They made a very good

Jonathan Winburn (Political Science) is the recipient of the 2006 David Hughes Memorial Award for outstanding paper presented recently at the 2007 Kentucky Political Science Association Annual Conference held at Morehead State University. The award was established to honor the memory of the former Centre College professor and 1972 KPSA President by recognizing the outstanding paper presented at the previous year's conference by a faculty member from a Kentucky college or university.

Phil Womble (Physics & Astronomy) was invited by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Science and Technology Directorate to provide a display of his DHS/NIHS project "Rail Tank Car Leakage Detection System" on March 16, 2007, in Washington, DC at a showcase event for members of Congress.

Steve Spencer (Recreation Administration) was selected as the Frank Lupton Service Award recipient at the Wilderness Education Association award ceremony during the National Conference on Outdoor Leadership held in Estes Park, CO in February. The Lupton Award is given to a member who has contributed significantly to the success of WEA and does an outstanding job representing the organization. **Spencer** currently represents WKU at WEA, and has been very active in the association since 1990. WKU hosted the Spring 2007 Kentucky Honors Roundtable (KHRT) Conference March 2 & 3, 2007. Coordinated by Honors graduate assistant **Stephanie Self**, under the supervision of **Craig Cobane** (Honors Program Director), this conference brought together Honors students from all across Kentucky and included presentations of student academic papers and creative activities, student forums on contemporary issues, and student caucuses to discuss common concerns. WKU students comprised 22 of the 50 panels, which also included presentations by students from several other Kentucky universities. The conference was a great success due to the efforts of many WKU student volunteers.

Ten members of the **WKU Forensic Team** won WKU's 7th consecutive IFA Inter-

national Championship in Argentina in March. WKU students took 8 first place finishes, 5 second place finishes, 7 third place finishes, 3 fourth place finishes, 5 fifth place finishes, and one sixth place finish. **Natalie Sintek** and **Jessica Furgeson** closed out the final round in Lincoln Douglas Debate while the team of **Barry Fields** and **Saeed Jones** placed second in Parliamentary Debate, and **Barry Fields** placed second in Historical Argentina Informative. **WKU debaters** also won the National Parliamentary Debate Association National Tournament in March. In just its second year at the tournament, WKU won the sweepstakes championship. WKU sent eight debate teams to this event and made history by having the largest number of teams from any one school to advance to break rounds. Congratulations!
