The Academic Quality Committee submits the following report for consideration by the SEC on Dec. 1.

- 1. SITEs: response to the CAD recommendations:
  - a. We accept the CAD recommendations and changes. The revised questions are:
    - i. What is your expected grade in this course?
    - ii. My instructor is organized and well-prepared for class.
    - iii. Expectations for course assignments are clear and specific.
    - iv. Assignments/exams are aligned with course learning objectives.
    - v. This course has effectively challenged me to think.
    - vi. My instructor provides constructive feedback.
    - vii. Overall, my instructor is effective.
    - viii. I have learned a lot in this course.
    - ix. My instructor treats me fairly with regard to race, age, sex, religion, national origin, disability, gender identity, and sexual orientation.
- 2. The committee discussed a faculty member's concern about student readiness:
  - a. Some students are unprepared for college in terms of computer literacy, writing ability, etc. Senate Bill 1 addresses these issues with regards to traditional students who have GPAs and ACT/ SAT scores. Non-traditional students do not have these indicators, and so the burden of preparedness is on the student. Additionally, Adult Learner Services are not readily available on the regional campuses.
    - The committee discussed several possible solutions including workshops, self-assessments, modified University Experience course, further engagement of Adult Learner Services.
    - ii. The committee recommends passing this issue on to the Retention Task Force.
- 3. The committee revisited the issue, raised in our last meeting, of late enrolled students. Doug McElroy shared the result of a recent analysis which showed that this is an issue for only a very small number of students (less than 1% of undergraduates). Because this is such a small number of students, we do not feel the need to pursue this issue.
