

Employment Projection

- Employment of ***child, family, and school social workers*** is expected to grow by about 12 percent, which is as fast as the average for all occupations.

- Mental health and substance abuse social workers*** will grow by almost 20 percent over the 2008–18 decade, which is much faster than the average. In particular, social workers specializing in substance abuse will experience strong demand. Opportunities for social workers in private practice will expand, as they are preferred over more costly psychologists.
