
## Jana Harrison, B.A. **Professional Writing, 2014**

Harrison chose to join the New Businesses team, which allowed her to relocate to London later that year.

Harrison is the Commercial Manager for Editions, a division of Deliveroo that focuses on delivery-only kitchens. "I primarily work with restaurant groups to help them expand through Deliveroo into new areas where the delivery demand is strong," said Harrison. Her passion for food, cultivated through her English coursework, is essential in her daily activities. "My English degree was crucial to getting me to where I am today," said Harrison.
