| Methods  | Eighteen (78%) of 23 graduating majors completed at least one HIP under anthropology faculty supervision. Of them, seven students completed one HIP, two students completed two HIPs, five students completed three HIPs, one student completed four HIPs, one student completed six HIPs, and one student completed eight HIPs, for a total of 50 HIPs. The types of HIPs were 16 academic or applied research projects, 12 service learning projects, nine experiential learning projects, six study abroad/away programs, and seven presentations at campus, state, and national conferences. Six students obtained internal funding to support their projects, includin two who won FUSE awards.
