Why did you choose this major?

I am a Social Work Major with a minor in Clinical and Community Behavioral Health. I was a Psychology major in the beginning of my college career but shortly after becoming my husband's full-time caregiver in 2013, I had to start interacting more with different social workers who assisted with my husband's care. I quickly came to realize that my true calling was within Social Work.

What are your plans post college?

After I get my MSW, I plan to work within the military community to help with the continuity of care issue. So many social workers leave and service members and their families must start all over with someone new. It can have a devastating negative effect on the clients and their treatment process. I hope to be able to alleviate that stress for at least few clients.

What is the Hidden Heroes campaign and how did you get involved?

The Elizabeth Dole Foundation along with Campaign Chair, Tom Hanks and Hidden Heroes Ambassadors, Tom Brokaw and Ryan Phillipe, launched The Hidden Heroes campaign on September 27, 2016. The campaign is aimed at bringing military and Veteran caregivers off the sidelines and raising awareness for the issues that are specific for caregivers.

The website, <u>HiddenHeroes.org</u> provides a place for caregivers around the world to sign up and can locate not only vetted resources but also a support system of caregivers that are located near them. This is important because many caregivers feel very isolated and don't realize how many others have the same or similar stories.

Many different organizations and businesses like USAA, The Independence Fund, American Airlines, Amazon, the Embassy of the United Arab Emirates, just to name a few, have jumped on board with Hidden Heroes and are providing many different resources, ranging from financial support,

legal and financial education, caregiver libraries and many more. We are currently asking different cities to sign up to be a Hidden Heroes Cities. Currently, there are over 50 cities that have committed to becoming a military caregiver friendly city that will assess and address specific needs of the caregiving community within that city. When I was offered the Fellowship within the Elizabeth Dole Foundation, I became an active advocate for the Hidden Heroes campaign.

What is your role as an advocate for KY Military and Veteran caregivers?

I am the Kentucky Dole Fellow Class of 2016-2017. My role within this amazing organization is to advocate on behalf of Kentucky's military and Veteran caregivers. Just this past September, I flew to DC with many other Dole Fellows from around the nation and we "stormed" Capitol Hill.

I had meeting with some of our state's elected officials to ask for their support of certain bills that are currently going through the House and the Senate. I also attempted to persuade them to join the Hidden Heroes Congressional caucus co-chaired by Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi, Senator John McCain, Senator Jack Reed, and Congressman Jeff Miller.
