The English Department will invite finalists, their teachers, and family to campus for a reception and ceremony on February 15th where they will be recognized. The winners will receive scholarships if they choose to major or minor in English at WKU and cash prizes whether or not they attend WKU. First Place: \$500 Scholarship and \$200 cash; Second Place: \$300 Scholarship and \$100 cash; Third Place: \$200 Scholarship and \$50 cash. Applications and essays are due January 15.

Read the poem carefully, and then write a well-organized, 500-750-word essay that discusses the overall theme and message of the poem and some of the poetic devices the poet uses to express that message. Be sure to analyze what the poem means as a whole and describe how its particulars work.
