Dr. Conor Scruton was out with friends during his graduation from Western Kentucky University. When one friend reminded him it was time, they had their own celebration of sorts. Scruton received his M.A. in English Language and Literature and received both Outstanding M.A. Student in English from Potter College and the Wood Award from the English Department. Scruton feels his greatest accomplishment came when defending his thesis and the feeling of validation of being told all of his stress and hard work had been a worthwhile project.

In his current position at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, he notes the similarities of his time as a teaching assistant at WKU. He teaches two undergraduate sections a semester, often freshman English composition, but occasionally he has the opportunity to teach a literature course. Although he uses his degree in English on a daily basis, he did want undergraduate English majors to remember that there are a multitude of ways English degrees can be used in the world today, not just in the teaching field. “My undergraduate degree has certainly been useful, but a lot of the opportunities I’ve received have been related to side interests or clubs, as well. College is about discovering what you want to do with your life, and I doubt you’ll ever regret exploring your options while you have the option to do so.”

Scruton was fortunate to be able to obtain his M.A. from WKU, noting the size of the program allowed him to receive the teaching experience he needed and a level of direct

instruction he does not feel he may have received in other programs into which he had been accepted.
