



Year-Round Pell will enable students to receive an additional Pell Grant disbursement so that they can receive grant aid to enroll continuously. The previous limitation to the Pell Grant was that if a student attended class full-time in the fall and spring, there was no aid left over for summer. Year-Round Pell provides students with the flexibility to study at their own pace and graduate earlier.

Beginning the summer of 2018, Pell Grants are available year round!

Thirty-two years ago, when I was just 17 years old, I wanted to join the military. My Mother would not sign the paperwork unless I promised to attend college and get a degree. I promised her that I would but I ended up serving full time in the U.S. Army and the Kentucky National Guard for the next thirty years. I retired from the military in 2016 and my Mother was diagnosed with terminal cancer later that same year. As I took care of her during her illness, she reminded me about the promise I had made all those years ago. Because I had given my Post GI Bill education benefit to my oldest daughter so she could attend college, I thought I would have to pay for my own education but I told my Mom that I would find a way to go to school and keep the promise I made.

My first stop at WKU was the VUB in Jones Jaggers Hall just to see if there was any support I could receive as a veteran to help pay for school. Rick Wright was outstanding in helping me by letting me know about Chapter 31 which could help with my education costs because I retired with a 90% disability rating from the VA. He also took me down the hall to the WKU EOC office and handed me over to the staff there to help me file my federal aid paperwork. Because my daughter was also attending WKU, the EOC helped us discover that we both qualified for aid. I would have never known anything about these financial aid programs and what was possible for my family on my own. Michelle Shutt at the EOC and Rick at VUB made it possible for both my daughter and I to go to college.

I am now a WKU graduate with a 3.45 average and will start graduate school at WKU this fall to work on a Masters in Counseling. But the most important thing of all is that I kept my promise to my Mom and I want to thank the EOC and VUB TRiO programs for helping make that promise come true. 
EOC Reaches Out to Veterans, Current Military and Their Families Kathy Fraim, EOC Coordinator, Glasgow

At the EOC sponsored Fairs, Veterans were able to access a variety of services including health testing provided by the WKU's Institute for Rural Health at the Barren County Fair and information on options available for veterans from Hosparus Health at the Logan County Fair.



Butler Co. Education Resource Fair

The 3rd annual Butler County Education Resource Fair was held, Monday, May 7, 2018 from 3:30-5:30 p.m. Approximately 60 vendors and attendees participated in the fair, this year. It was initiated by WKU's Educational Opportunity Centers (EOC,) a federal grant TRiO program. The EOC collaborated with the Butler County Library, Board of Education, and Adult Education to host this community outreach event.





Attendees were given access to resources that

assist them with going back to school and information of community services. South Central Community & Technical College, Kentucky Wesleyan, and Brescia were ready to assist with post-secondary education. KHEAA and EOC dispersed information on financial aid. A representative from Veteran's Upward Bound helped veterans who expressed a desire to return to school. In addition, Butler County Adult Educa-

tion assisted attendees that needed help getting their GED.

The Butler County Extension Office, Chamber of Commerce, Board of Education/Family Resources, and Library were other vendors that provided excellent information and resources at this year's fair.

Money! Money! Money!



Educational Opportunity Centers counselors can help you with two big questions. First, they can help you figure out how much it will cost to go to college. What is the tuition at the school you want to attend? Other costs can include books, fees, parking passes, required meal plans, and childcare. These costs can add quite a bit to the money you will need each semester. EOC counselors will help you take a good look to make sure you are fully aware of what going to college will actual-

ly cost you as you progress toward a degree.

The second question is – how much money is available to help you with the costs of attending college? EOC counselors can help you complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) to determine if you qualify for a Pell Grant and how much that Pell Grant will give you each semester. In addition to Pell Grants, EOC counselors can help make sure you have applied for any grant money the state might provide and any special scholarships – like the Work Ready Kentucky program – that might also be available to help with costs.
