The anthropology major requires completion of a second major or minor. The suggested program of study shown below should be used in consultation with your advisor(s). Every student will finish with a unique plan of his/her own depending on the electives and the second major or minor selected.

Applied anthropology is the use of anthropological knowledge, methods, and theories to address contemporary human problems throughout the world, such as human rights abuses, social injustice, poverty, environmental degradation, loss of cultural heritage, and educational inequities. All anthropology subdisciplines – cultural anthropology, linguistic anthropology, biological anthropology, and archaeology – have applied aspects. Anthropologists demonstrate a unique capability in helping to solve human problems through building partnerships in research and policy development; acknowledging the perspectives of all people involved; focusing on challenges and opportunities presented by biological and cultural diversity; and addressing imbalances in resources, rights, and power.

Colonnade General Education Program: For more details and courses offered, visit the [website](#). ANTH 120 or ANTH 130 fulfills the Social and Behavioral Sciences requirement in **Explorations**. Several anthropology courses may be used to fulfill one **Connections** requirement. For the **World Language Requirement**, language proficiency of novice-high before completing 60 credit hours is required (or completion of second level of a language). Two credits (or equivalent) of a single world language in high school satisfies this WKU requirement.

Anthropology Major Program: Anthropology majors must earn a grade of C or better in all core courses in the major: ANTH 120, 125, 130, 135, 399, 499. Course numbers and prerequisites are subject to change; consult with your anthropology advisor each semester. Some upper-level anthropology courses are offered in a limited rotation (one offering each two years); anthropology majors must work closely with their anthropology advisors and pay attention to course rotations and offerings in order to schedule these classes when they are offered.
