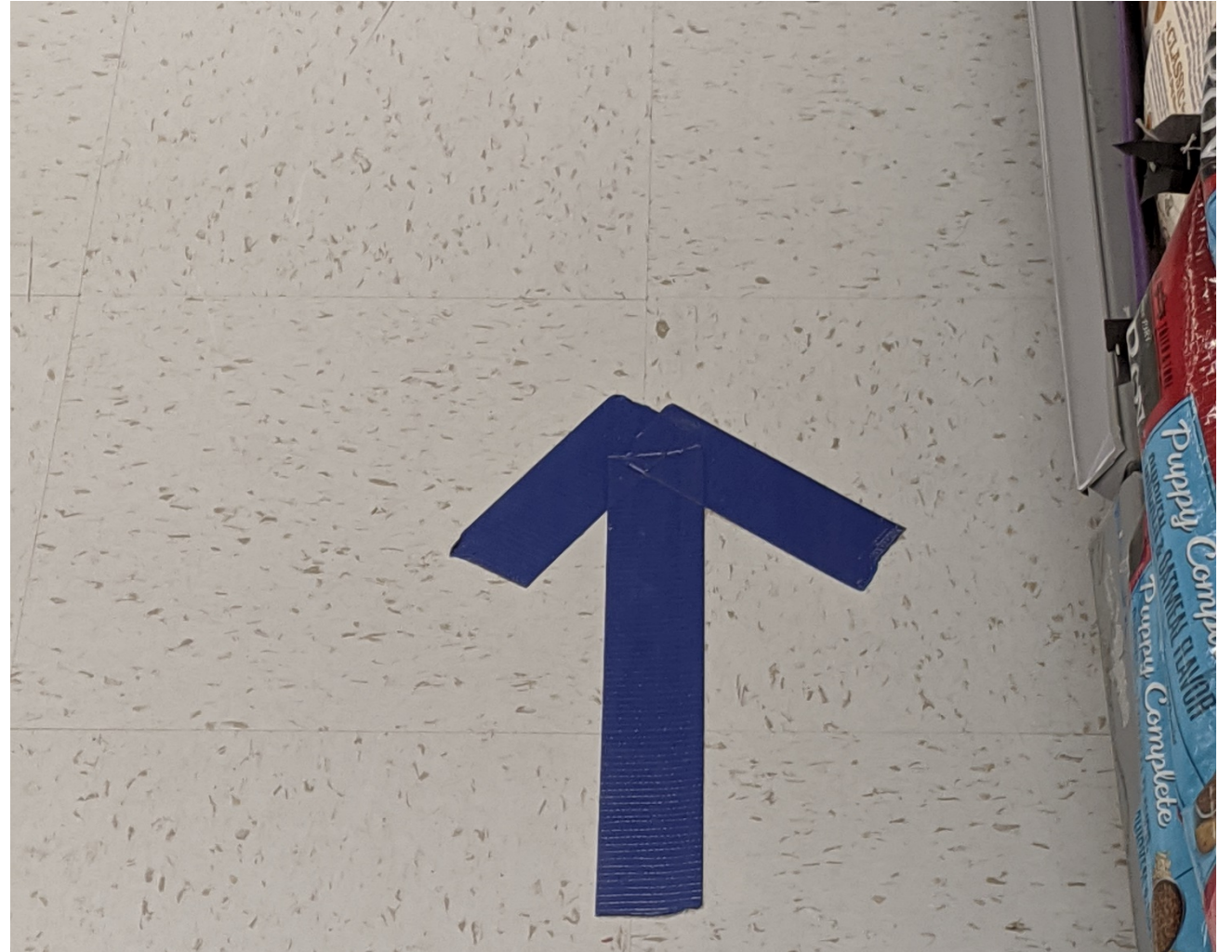
The toilet paper aisle at Walmart during the Covid-19 quarantine. People began early on hoarding toilet paper and paper towels among other items.



As more and more information trickled down from health authorities, the new distance between people should be at least 6 feet.

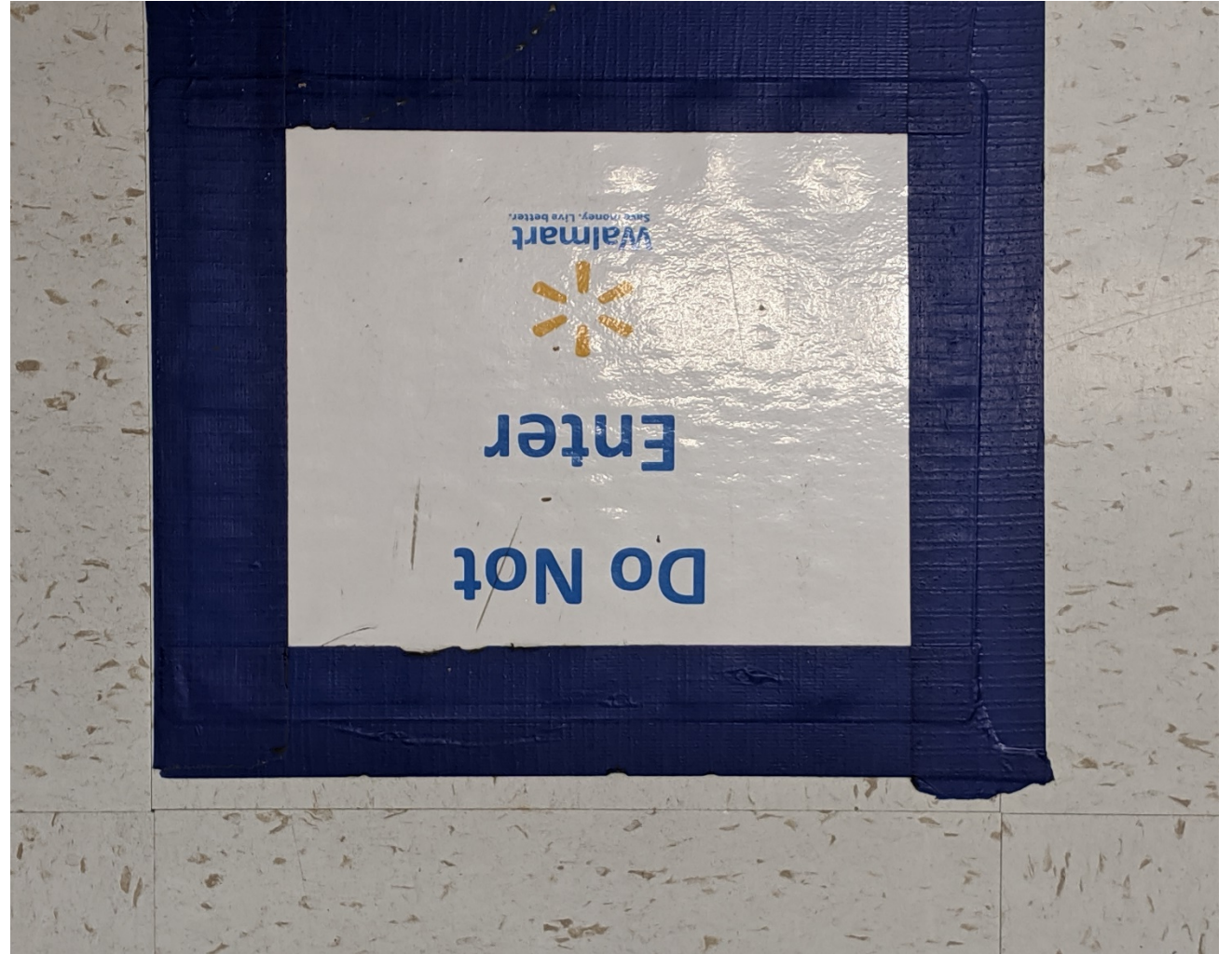
