

Cheerleaders dominating season continues with two regional titles and a state championship

The Rebels Small Varsity Cheer team won the KHSAA State Championship, Dec. 14, at All Tech Arena in Lexington, KY.

The Rebels posted a final score of 96.1 and beat second place Pikeville by more than six points.

This win highlights the Rebels dominant run so far this season. Before winning state, they had already won two regional tournaments and a state wide tournament.

Head coach Michelle Schuster says that there is a lot of pressure being reigning national champs. She hopes that after their state championship they can place top three at nationals later this season.

"I am proud of how this team has handled the pressure. They continue to be humble and persevere," Schuster said.

Seniors Ashtyn Fangman, Lanie Fangman, and Madi Monroe all recognize the pressure that comes with winning the national championship, but they say that their team possesses a unique drive and work ethic that allows them to outperform their opponents.

"The best part of being a part of the varsity team this year is that we have a team that is willing to do anything to succeed," Lanie Fangman said. "I've never seen a team have as much determination and drive as this one.'

"At competitions, we all know that the person standing to the left and right to us are going to be able to do their job in our routine. We have a focused, driven mentality," she said.

That was one thing Monroe could get behind when describing the team's success this season.

"No one on the team wants it more than the next. All 12 of us

give it our all every time our music turns on," Monroe said.

Ashtyn said the amount of talent on this team is "crazy", and that this team has the most talent out of any team she's ever been on.

We all breathe cheerleading, and we are all so dedicated to be the best at what we can do," Ashtyn Fangman said. "The skill we have is one thing, but the drive and dedication we have is rare to find in a lot of teams, and I think that's why we have been successful so far.'

This is the first time a team sport at Boone has won at state since the 1971 wrestling team.

They also mentioned that their bond with their teammates has also been a big part of their historic run. After years of cheering together, they've grown closer and closer to each other.

"I thought after last year I would never be as close to a team I was, but I was wrong," Monroe said. "These girls are my best friends. They all have the same drive which makes cheering four days a week worth it."

Ashtyn Fangman said that every person on the team cares about each other and they treat each other like family.

"We've been dreaming of having a team like this together since 6th grade," Ashtyn said. "I've grown so close to these girls and growing the Boone legacy with them has been a dream.


The Rebels haven't lost a competition since last season and with a young group of talented underclassmen and senior leadership they could make even more history down in Orlando later this season.


The junior varsity team won their division at two different regional tournaments this season before getting ninth at state.

ning to retire in 2020 after working in Boone County for 37 years, leading them for the last 12 years. Dr. Randy Poe announced to the Boone County School Board on Nov. 14 that his retirement will take effect on June 30, 2020.

He has worked as a teacher and coach at Boone; assistant principal at Conner Middle School; principal at R. A. Jones Middle School; Executive Director of Research, Data, and Technology; assistant superintendent; deputy superintendent and is ending his career as the superintendent of the district.

'Upon my student teaching, which was here at Boone County, I decided that I really enjoyed teaching and that (it) was a passion," Poe said.

Boone principal Bill Baker asked Poe to teach introduction to marketing, retail management, and entrepreneurship.

While teaching at Boone, Poe also coached the soccer and tennis teams, had multiple players go into the state semifinals, and was inducted into the Northern Kentucky Soccer Coach Hall of Fame. While coaching, his soccer team won the Northern Kentucky Athletic Conference.

He said one goal of his when he first started as superintendent was to make sure all of the students were "career, colOutstanding Alumnus Award, the 2013 KASA Superintendent of the Year Award, and the most recent being the 2019 NKYEC Spirit of the Region Award along with several other awards.

"For the last 37, years the Boone County School District has been my second home," Poe said in a letter to Boone County schools families.

For the past eight years, Boone County Schools has had an average composite ACT score of 20 or above, and Poe has helped with that by supporting giving students more opportunities to be in college classes and adding college readiness assessments. Boone County's ACT scores have increased to give Boone County the title of the highest performing diverse public school district in Kentucky according to the Northern Kentucky Tribune.

After retiring, he said he plans on spending more time with his grandchildren and taking more opportunities to play golf, which he enjoys. For his career after retirement, he will be working in the region as the executive director of the Northern Kentucky Education Council, continuing his passion for working with kids.

Hongkongers protest against Chinese government

Political crisis was sparked in June by new extradition law



What started as peaceful protests in response to an extradition bill quickly turned into Hong Kong's worst political crisis in decades: the "Water Revolution."

Known more commonly as the "Hong Kong Protests," the Water Revolution is the name given to the current wide-spread movement in Hong Kong, a territory under the sovereign state of China.

Originally, the protests started in June and opposed a bill that would allow for the detaining and extradition to mainland China and Taiwan of wanted fugitives in Hong Kong.

Hong Kong's refusal to defer the bill sparked the protests to turn violent, and while the bill was eventually withdrawn, demonstrators claim the decision was "too little, too late.'

Now, protesters are advocating stronger civil liberties for for

Hongkongers, as well as a strengthened form of democracy within the region's government.

Chinese officials have largely condemned the protests, calling them a "threat" to the nation. Yang Guang, spokesperson of the State Council Office for Hong Kong, said the movement was "evil and criminal," and later told protestors to "not play with fire."

Violent methods of protest have become increasingly more commonplace as the Water Revolu-tion continues, a "necessary expense," as one demonstrator put it. Said methods include the blockade of airports, the destruction of government facilities, and the disturbance of Hong Kong's primary public transportation system, the "MTR" (Mass Transit Railway).

The police response to the situation has also become a concern, with many calling the Hong Kong law enforcement into question over alleged corruption and abuse of power. Over 5,000 arrests have been made thus far, many of which have been argued as "unlawful" by protestors.

Fear of being shot with rubber bullets or subjected to tear gas has led many protestors to wear helmets, body armor, and eye-goggles, as well



as carry weapons of their ownranging from pepper spray to baseball bats.

In early October, an 18-yearold demonstrator was captured on video getting shot by police, the first instance of a live round being used since protests started.

The use of face masks in Hong Kong was banned in October of last


year, with offenders facing a year of jail time. The move was used as an 'emergency" measure by the government to help identify protestors.

One young protestor, who referred to himself as Chan, told Business Insider that he, along with "almost all frontline protestors," are "ready to be arrested or die" in the efforts to secure their demands.

Despite the efforts by Hong Kong's government to suppress the movement, the number of participants and media coverage has only increased.

An estimated 2 million demonstrators attended the largest rally last year, and more events of a similar turnout are expected this year.



Hundreds killed in Iran during gas hike protest

Editor's note: This story was written in December 2019, before the recent escalation between Iran and the U.S.

The streets of Iran have erupted in protest.

These protests, that started on a small scale, have turned into what the New York Times has called the, "deadliest political unrest since the Islamic Revolution 40 years ago, with at least 180 people killed."

This catastrophic unrest was born after a significant hike in gas prices, with citizens beginning to storm the streets.

The gas prices were just the beginning of the unrest, as the protests escalated to a larger movement and were met with backlash from security forces, largely on young men.

Further reports and imagery have revealed that this protest has evolved into a nationwide effort, making it even more significant.

According to the Atlantic, somewhere between 200 to more than 1,000 are now dead with over 7,000 imprisoned.

Images of charred property and destruction have surfaced worldwide highlighting the nature of this conflict.

In the midst of this protest, the Trump Administration has begun to speak on issues of human rights, referencing these events in Iran.

"This administration has taken a completely opposite view of the important political protests, the freedom-seeking, the freedom-loving people of Iran, than President Obama and his administration did," said Secretary of State Mike Pompeo.

"these people are simply asking for a basic set of freedoms, and the Iranian leadership-that regime should change in a way that reflects the desires of their own people," Pompeo said.



'Half-Life: Alyx' aims to take VR to the mainstream

After 12-year hiatus, Valve bringing series back with VR

In 1998, "Half-Life" blew away the 3D gaming scene and pulled 3D shooters into the next generation. Its 2004 sequel, "Half-Life 2," continued to break barriers and even won Best Game of the Decade from IGN and several others

However, the last time players picked up Gordon Freeman's crowbar was in 2007 with "Half-Life 2: Episode 2," which ended with a gutwrenching cliffhanger.

After 12 years of waiting for another chapter in the Half-Life series, many fans thought they would never again pick up the legendary crowbar.

That all changed with a tweet on Nov. 18.

Valve announced "Half-Life: Alyx," one of three full-length virtual reality games the company is developing, the next installment in the Half Life series, and Valve's

using the VR controllers or "gravity gloves" to get supplies, use interfaces, throw objects, and engage in combat.

Like the gravity gun from "Half-Life 2," the gravity gloves allow the player to manipulate gravity.

The trailer suggests the game is extremely interactive as well, having the player move aside objects on a shelf to reveal previously hidden shotgun shells or throw a nearby bottle to distract a combine soldier.

The game also features Valve's new engine, Source 2, which improves game performance by utilizing proper multi-core rendering and newer technologies like Vulkan and DirectX 11, meaning CPU requirements are reduced. It also includes a new physics engine.

Character models are also somewhat different with more seamless designs which is expected, but characters also look more cartoonish with emphasis on certain parts of the face.

Even though it may not be the "Half-Life 3" fans wanted, many feel the game is a promising reawakening for the beloved series and a leap in the right direction for VR.

The release date is currently March 2020.


Pleli expects to see Boone changing a lot by 2020. She has concerns that students may become even more dependent on their phones than they already are.

David Kohl has been an English and yearbook teacher at Boone for 25 years. During that time he has witnessed many changes, especially throughout the past decade.



Michelle Schuster has been a science teacher at Boone for 22 years. She has been here through the 2010s and all of the changes at Boone that came along with it.

Schuster noticed that cell phones are something that have become more common in classrooms today.

"Ten years ago a student would be terrified to pull out a cell phone in class, but now it's normal," she said.

She also pointed out that more AP and dual enrollment classes have been available for students to take as well as the early college program.

As the cheer coach, she has witnessed the cheer team build itself back up, after program and school lost students with the opening of Cooper. The team won nationals in 2019, and will compete again in 2020 after they won the Kentucky state cheer competition.

Schuster said that one thing that has grown a lot stronger over the past decade is the extracurricular programs offered at Boone. She believes that there is something at Boone for everyone, if not a sport, then some other type of extracurricular activity.

Schuster thinks that Boone will be changing a lot by 2020. She thinks that the classroom instruction will be a lot more individualized to cater to each student's needs.

2010 Baseball wins region

The varsity baseball team finished the season with a 27-12 record. They scored in double digits 15 times that season on their way to winning the district tournament against Conner 12 -7. They then went on to win the Regional championship against Dixie heights 3-1.

2010 Football advances to state semis

The Rebels recorded a 9-5 record that season which was their best record since 2008. They improved from a 3-7 record the previous year and won the 6A Regional Championship against Lexington Lafayette. They advanced all the way to the state semifinals where they lost to Scott 16-14. They combined for 3,984 total yards on offense.

2012 Basketball teams sweep region

For the first time in school history, the boys and girls basketball teams won the region and qualified for the state tourney in same year. The varsity boys team won 54-49 over Newport Central Catholic and the varsity girls team won 62-58 over Notre Dame. Forward Sydney Moss lead the team with (23.3) points per game and (10.2) rebounds per game. She went on to win Miss Kentucky Basketball.

2012 Boys soccer wins region

The Varsity Boys Soccer team finished with a 20-4-3 record. They defeated Newport Central Catholic 2-0 to win the Region 9 Championship for the first time since 2002. They made it all the way to the state semifinals where they lost to St. Xavier 2-0.

2015 Girls soccer reaches region finals


The Girls Varsity Soccer team finished with a 17-7-2 record. They won the district championship against Conner 3-0 and advanced all the way to the regional final against Notre Dame where they lost 3-1.

2015 Fookes retires with 686 wins

After 30 years of coaching the Varsity Girls Basketball team, Fookes won 686 out of 941 games (.729). Since she started in 1985, she never recorded a losing season at BCHS. She ranks third all-time on the Kentucky win list. She won 22 district titles, and 9 regional titles. After her tenure with the school was over, the court was named in her likeness.

2017 Boys swim and dive reaches state

Junior Robby Winterman tied for first place in the 50 free at regionals. He became the first swimmer to win a regional event for Boone and he qualified for state in the process. Senior Nick Berry, junior Sean Courtney, and junior Adam Persons all qualified for state that season as well. Berry finished as the leading scorer in program history (1338) and the team finished 31st overall which is the best finish in a state











2017 Golfer Finn gnalifies for state

Landon Finn qualified for state for the first time in his career after winning a tiebreaker at the regional tournament. He shot a 74 at the 7th Region Tournament after suffering a mallet fracture in his right ring finger on the ninth hole of the tournament. It was the first time since 2011 a boy qualified for state. He went on to shoot a 79 at state to end his high school career.

2018 Girls bowling caps record run

The Girls Bowling team won the regional tournament for the sixth straight year in a row, dating back to the 2012-2013 season. They defeated the 2 seed Cooper to advance to state. They finished the season with a perfect 12-0 record. They tied the football teams from 1985-1990 for the most consecutive regional team championships.

2019 Cheer wins state and nationals

Over the calender year of 2019, the girls Varsity Cheer team have won countless events, won the KHSAA State Championship, and also became the UCA National High School Cheerleading Champions. There success continues into 2020 as they attempt to become repeat National Champions.

Casey: The hardest part was trying to convey all the attitude and humor she has.


Q - What makes a good scene for a character?

A man was arrested after he was found hiding inside a closet in a Wisconsin home Dec. 10.




According to the family members, while inside the closet, Coleman uttered, "Ho Ho Ho," and told the family members that if they opened the closet it would ruin their Christmas surprise.
