"We would take a bite, and if it's not ready, then it's really bitter tasting," said Webster. "If it's ready, it's really sweet."

Her slogan of "Rare, yet mighty" reflects how Webster hopes to make her customers feel when they visit her store.



"I want to empower women so that, whenever they do come into the shop, they feel a sense of worthiness and they feel something is rare, yet mighty about themselves," said Webster.

Webster says that she hopes to give any woman that comes into the store something to feel positive about.

"I feel like women are so hard on themselves," said Webster. "We beat ourselves up every day, especially in the dressing room. So, watching a woman find something that she feels beautiful in or finding a part of her body that she's finally feeling confident in for the first time in her life, that's so rewarding."

Webster says that she plans on staying in the Beaver Dam area, but hopes to expand both her physical store and her store's online presence in the future. She says that she has received overwhelming support from the local customers.

"It means the world to me when customers ask how the business is doing and are truly genuine about wanting the business to succeed and remain a part of the community," said Webster.
