Among the prize winners was Bonnie Reagan, who won a bubble maker for her daughter Arya.

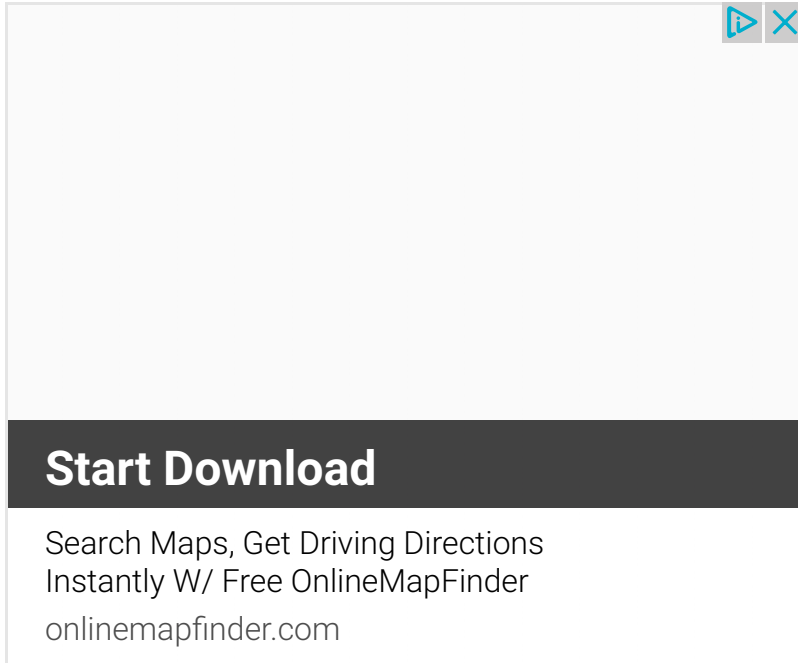
"It's been really nice," said Reagan, adding that it was her daughter's first time seeing a puppet show. "She was really fascinated."

Now the mother of a 3-year-old son, Bogle appreciates the lessons in a different way.

“If there’s more stuff like this for kids to watch, there might be less of a bullying problem,” she said. “It’s fun, but it also teaches a really good lesson.”



McCarty agreed and said the organization aims to teach children valuable lessons.

“We attempt to teach acceptance of themselves and their world,” she said.

Rebecca Scruggs of Meadow Land Baptist Church attended with 14 kids from her church’s youth program, called Building Soldiers for Christ. For Scruggs, the visit was a break from the strictures of Sunday school and a chance to have fun. Teresa Blair-Reno, a Sunday school teacher at the church, agreed.

“They can profess their faith and still have a good time,” Blair-Reno said.

Maddie Gill, a 14-year-old girl, was among the group. After a summer of swimming and cooking out, she’s not quite ready to go back to school.

“Summer’s my favorite,” she said.
