Course Requirements for P-12 Teacher Certification in French, German and Spanish

Certification in French, German, or Spanish requires completion of the following content and education courses. In addition, students must arrange to take an official Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI) *prior to student teaching*. The American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL), in collaboration with the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE), recommends that students achieve a rating of Advanced Low on the OPI before they are licensed to teach.
