Ekaterina Myakshina (often known as Ekaterina Pavlovna to her students or Katya to her colleagues) is the Russian instructor at Western Kentucky University. Originally from Russia, Myakshina enjoys teaching her own language and culture to American students. Much of her passions lie in Russian literature and dance and is evidenced in her teaching. Her students would call her knowledgeable, passionate, funny, and inspiring.



Currently, WKU offers a two-year sequence of Russian (101, 102, 201, and 202) and Myakshina teaches these courses every academic year. Moreover, WKU offers the Russian and East European Studies minor comprised of courses in Russian, political science, and history, and further prepares students who wish to use their Russian language skills in their future career. An education in Russian language and culture can be very valuable to students, as it is also a critical language as defined by the U.S. Department of State. In addition to teaching, Myakshina remains involved in the extracurricular events on campus and tries to tie in her knowledge of Russian culture throughout the campus community.
