

New Zealand: Recreation & Tourism in Middle-earth

On this 16-day educational adventure, students will explore the world's largest industry (leisure/travel) in one of the world's most amazing places: New Zealand. Prior to departure, students will participate in learning activities and assignments to become familiar with the leisure/travel industry and prepare for the out-of-country program.

REC 482/482G* (3 hours) – New Zealand: Recreation & Tourism in Middle-earth

*This course can substitute for REC 420 in the Tourism minor and the Community Recreation minor; it is also an elective for the Recreation Administration major and the Facilities and Event minor. There are no prerequisites for the course.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Through in-country experiential learning (and other modes), students will be immersed in the "Recreation, Event, and Tourism industry model." Course destinations, learning activities, and local experts will help teach content while providing a unique chance to experience, firsthand, the innovative aspects of the New Zealand leisure/travel industry and connect academic knowledge to professional practice.

Planned recreational and tourism activities for this program may include: surfing, sea kayaking, stand-up paddleboarding, 'blackwater rafting' and cave exploration, visiting a geothermal site, experiencing Maori cultural tourism, visiting filming locations such as Hobbiton film, behind the scenes tour at WETA Cave, New Zealand national museum, jet boat ride, Milford Sound tour, and hiking.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course the student should be able to:

- Demonstrate an understanding of the commercial recreation and tourism industries through course assignments and quizzes.
- Apply an understanding of the interrelationships of commercial recreation and tourism (as proposed in the "Recreation, event, and tourism industry model") through course assignments.
- Develop an understanding of the diversity in New Zealand in terms of culture, natural resources, geography, and leisure/tourism opportunities.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the broad array of employment opportunities available in commercial recreation and tourism.
- Discuss challenges related to providing leisure/travel opportunities while minimizing natural resource and cultural disturbances.
- Explain the differences and similarities in the leisure/travel opportunities between the USA and New Zealand.

- Permission of instructor(s) is required.
