PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

News & Information track chair/Bremner Editing Center director, University of Kansas School of Journalism (2012-present)

As chair of the News & Information track, one of two divisions in the School of Journalism, I have a major role in curriculum and assessment decisions, determine news course offerings and scheduling, shape the goals of the track and guide the news faculty toward those goals. As director of the Bremner Editing Center, I help students one-on-one, provide resources and training for student and professional editors, and advocate for the craft of editing. I manage a small staff as well as the Center's social media presence. Additionally, I teach news editing, writing and technology/production classes (two per semester), and I created and manage an online, self-directed grammar class for all new journalism students. I am also an affiliated faculty member with the university's Center for Russian, East European and Eurasian Studies.

Deputy News Desk Chief, The Wichita (Kansas) Eagle (2005-2012)

I edited local and wire service news stories, wrote headlines and photo captions, checked page proofs before press, and supervised the copy desk when the desk chief was absent. I wrote book reviews and a monthly books column and later took on the role of Books page editor, and I launched the Grammar Monkeys blog and Twitter account, which I grew from zero to 23,000 followers.

Vice President-Conferences, American Copy Editors Society (2010-2014)

I organized the annual national conference and several regional training workshops each year for the leading professional copy editors' association in the country. This included arranging and scheduling session presenters and the annual keynote speaker, organizing the program, working with vendors, and site selection and logistics.
