- a. Policy Committee (Appendix C) *Day. two polices set forth as action items have been moved to information items due to the need for additional discussion: JUMP Policy revision and undergraduate enrollment in graduate courses policy. An Ad Hoc committee will be formed to create a recommendation within the upcoming academic year
- *Schugart details the recommendations of the policy committee
- *Koodali Provost expressed concerns over policy committee meetings. Provost recommended allowing JUMP students up to 12 graduate credit hours and double counting 9 hours.
- *Schugart. Discusses meetings with the Provost.

- *Laves, acting SACSCOC liaison. Discusses research on SACSCOC universities and most land at the 9 hours of double count and 12 as maximum of graduate hours. Anything above is an outlier and would be examined very carefully by the committee and not be accepted. Based on a conversation with the VP for SACSCOC, additional justification is required for programs that have less than 150 credit hours in combined programs, because it could affect the integrity of the Undergraduate and graduate degree. Best to lie within the SACSCOC recommendation.
- *Burch states concern that the six to nine double counting doesn't take into account the number of credit hours for the graduate programs with SACSCOC.
- *Laves states that justification for outlier policies will be difficult to draft and may not have the desired result without input from the undergraduate curriculum committee or governance. When an undergraduate course is replaced by a graduate course, it calls into question the integrity of that graduate course.
- *Burch points out that the JUMP programs with rigorous requirements shows the integrity of the graduate course.
- *Burch and Laves discuss the justification for SACSCOC and the concerns regarding the SACSCOC VP recommendation.
- *Dick provides background on the past efforts to create a university policy for JUMP.
- *Discussion ensues.
- *Day asks that Price serve on the ad hoc committee for JUMP policy.
- *Schugart. Additional information is available via a spreadsheet that was previously shared.
- *Day explains that the ad hoc committee was formed because there needs to be adequate communication with groups on campus that are not in the Graduate Council.

A standard policy will align with accreditation expectations from Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) and also ensure the highest quality of both the undergraduate and graduate degree experience.

2.1 Existing

Joint Undergraduate-Master's Degree Programs (JUMP)

JUMP programs provide academically outstanding students the opportunity to complete both an undergraduate and graduate degree in approximately five years. Qualified students who have been admitted to a JUMP program may complete a maximum of 18 graduate hours as an undergraduate student and count a maximum of 12 hours on both the undergraduate and graduate transcript as prescribed by the program. Students will apply to Graduate School upon or before earning more than 18 graduate hours. Each JUMP program has individualized admission criteria. Search "JUMP" in this catalog for a complete list of programs and contact the academic department for additional information.

2.2 Proposed

Joint Undergraduate-Master's Degree Program (JUMP)

JUMP provides academically exceptional students the opportunity to complete both an undergraduate and graduate degree in an accelerated time period. Qualified students will apply directly to an individual Joint Undergraduate Master's Program which will make a recommendation to the Graduate School for admission to JUMP. JUMP students may complete a maximum of 12 graduate hours as an undergraduate student in graduate programs with less than 33 required credit hours, a maximum of 15 graduate hours as an undergraduate student in graduate programs with at least 33 required credit hours and less than 36 required credit hours, and a maximum of 18 graduate hours as an undergraduate student in graduate programs with 36 or more required credit hours. Except in programs with 36 or more required credit hours may be counted on both the undergraduate and graduate transcript as prescribed by the approved program curriculum. For graduate programs with 36 or more required credit hours, a maximum of 12 graduate hours may be double counted on both transcripts as prescribed by the approved program curriculum. JUMP students will apply for admission to the Graduate School for the corresponding Master's Program upon or before earning the maximum number of graduate hours, as prescribed for their program, or upon earning the

bachelor's degree, whichever occurs first. Program admission criteria for the Master's degree may be waived for JUMP students at the discretion of individual program Directors and/or Committees.

New JUMP programs require approval from the Undergraduate Council, Graduate Council, and if applicable, SACSCOC.

Individual Joint Undergraduate-Master's Degree Program may have more stringent and/or additional admission and continuance requirements, including for matriculation into the Master's program. These criteria will be published in the undergraduate and/or graduate catalog. However, minimum requirements for admission and continuance in JUMP include:

For JUMP admission eligibility:

- A minimum of 60 credit hours earned and lacking no less than 15 credit hours to complete the undergraduate degree
- A minimum of 24 undergraduate hours earned at WKU
- A minimum cumulative undergraduate GPA of 3.25

For Continuance:

- Continuous enrollment (excluding winter and summer terms, including, but not limited to, military service, parental leave, and medical leave)
- Maximum enrollment of 15 graduate hours per term
- Undergraduate JUMP students must maintain a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher in graduate courses
- Once admitted to the Graduate School, JUMP students must adhere to the Graduate Academic Standing policy

Failure to meet continuance requirements will result in dismissal from JUMP. Upon dismissal, graduate coursework may not be double-counted. Graduate coursework will be removed from the undergraduate transcript and recorded on the graduate transcript only.

Graduate credits earned through JUMP may only be applied toward one undergraduate and one graduate degree. These credits may not be applied to any additional WKU programs.

Once admitted to the Graduate School, students are classified as graduate students and no longer qualify for undergraduate classification for any purpose, including financial aid. Likewise, students admitted to the Graduate School are eligible for all graduate student privileges, including graduate assistantships and graduate student research grants.

Once admitted to a particular JUMP program, students may not switch programs. JUMP students at both the undergraduate or graduate level may appeal aspects of this policy to the Graduate School.

3. Rationale for proposed policy:

3.1 The Graduate School (Associate Provost for Research and Graduate Education) requests that the Graduate Council provide clarification on this policy, including:

A university-wide Joint Undergraduate Master's Program policy that ensures minimum standards for admission and matriculation of exceptional students and timely completion of the accelerated program while maintaining rigor and integrity of the undergraduate and graduate degree programs and ensuring student learning objectives at both levels are satisfactorily met.

- 4.2 Impact on populations that may be affected: Programs may need to revise their JUMP eligibility criteria to be consistent with the university-wide JUMP Policy.

- 1. Policy Name: Undergraduate Enrollment in Graduate Courses (Graduate Catalog)
- **2. Description:** Limit undergraduate enrollment in graduate courses to seniors, enact a 6-hour maximum, and require approval of the student's advisor and the course's instructor of record.

2.1 Existing

Undergraduate Student Enrollment in Graduate Courses

Undergraduate students at Western Kentucky University may request to enroll in graduate courses by submitting an "Undergraduate Taking Graduate Courses" form to the Graduate School. Conditions for approval include:

- having earned at least 75 undergraduate credit hours;
- and, having a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0.

Undergraduate students may accumulate a maximum of 12 graduate credits. In addition, undergraduate students are restricted to a maximum of 15 hours enrollment per term, including graduate and undergraduate credits. All graduate coursework will be on the graduate transcript. To move the coursework to the undergraduate transcript students should contact the Office of the Registrar.

2.2 Proposed

Undergraduate Student Enrollment in Graduate Courses

Undergraduate students classified as Seniors at Western Kentucky University and who have a minimum cumulative undergraduate GPA of 3.0 may enroll in up to 6 hours of graduate coursework, or minimum cumulative GPA of 3.25 may enroll in up to 12 hours of graduate coursework, with approval of advisor and instructor of record.

Undergraduate students enrolled in graduate courses are restricted to a maximum enrollment of 15 hours per term. Graduate credit earned as an undergraduate student may be applied at either the undergraduate or graduate level, but not both.

This policy does not apply to students enrolled in a Joint Undergraduate-Masters Program (JUMP).

3. Rationale for proposed policy:

- 3.1 The Graduate School (Associate Provost for Research and Graduate Education) requests that the Graduate Council provide clarification on this policy, including:
 - Restricting graduate enrollment to Seniors students only
 - Allowance for graduate credits to apply to an undergraduate or graduate degree program, but not both (with the exception of students enrolled in a JUMP)
 - Clarify that undergraduate enrollment in graduate courses requires approval of both advisor and instructor of record for the graduate course(s)
- 4. Impact on existing academic or non academic policies:
- 4.1 Impact on policies: no negative impact anticipated
- 4.2 Impact on populations that may be affected: Instructors of record for graduate courses will need to approve undergraduate enrollment in their course(s). Advisors of undergraduate students will need to approve undergraduate enrollment in graduate courses. Undergraduates wishing to enroll in graduate courses must be classified as Seniors.
