1. The State House met and recommended a cut in funding to higher education
2. The Senators removed the cuts, and the House restored the cuts

E. Advisory Member Reports:

1. Provost, Robert "Bud" Fischer

- Continue to monitor FY 26
- Almost all of the colleges are done with FY 27
- Ramp continues to meet. Recommendations during the summer-FY28
- HB 490 passed; this is not a mandate. This is a guide because some universities in Kentucky had no guidelines for Tenure dismissal. Dr. Fischer will come back with recommendations.
- Great Student Scholars Showcase
- WKU has two Goldwater Scholars
- Promotion and Tenure announced May 7<sup>th</sup>.

2. SGA President, Rush Robinson

- SGA held elections last week
  - Caden Lucas, President is a 4<sup>th</sup> generation Hilltopper
  - Jacob Barker, VP

3. Staff Senate Liaison, Andria Henry, No report

- Staff elections held next week. Sixteen people are running.

4. Faculty Regent, Shane Spiller

- HB 490: Vast differences across the state institutions. We want the lawyers' perspective on whether we are complying with state mandates. OCT 1 if the board wants to make changes. Faculty handbook vs. state law
- State funding: It's over. Spring brings on the workload via the State legislature. They want us to be appreciative of the money they give. Inflation has decreased if the current money works.
- We are working towards the P3 housing deal. It is not a fully done deal. It is a complicated deal. Housing is a primary problem with recruitment and retention. There are things for students to do, but housing. We need to recognize that this is a major hindrance to us. There will be a meeting on that
- Tenure and promotion- It is a really big deal, and the board is aware of this, being a full professor. It is truly an honor. A special call meeting for tenure and promotion. Please come.
- McKerral- The State Legislature rarely gives money back.
- Fischer; the Senate and House never agreed on the budget. The Senate wanted to be flat or more. 12 hours in conference. There was an increase in '23. Some of it was taken back for insurance.

G. New Business:

1. Senate Charter Revision - First Reading (Report Posted)

- First reading for the Colonnade charter change. We are not voting
- Pruitt/Wichman requested that the discussion be limited to 15 minutes
- Petkus: Asked for a friendly amendment of 20 minutes: Motion approved with one opposed
- Petkus: Received feedback from multiple people in PCAL
  - Against: A. Will remove the General Education as a standing Senate committee; appointments from the administration are not faculty governance. B. Ideas can die in the proposed committee. C. Transparency was lacking in the working

general education committee. D. Asked that this vote not take place during the May meeting, where there will be less attendance, and the Herald will not be present. Asked if this can be squashed if possible.

- Pruitt: Is there a different process to seat faculty other than the Provost seating the committee?
- Andy: The charter change is trying to solve the assessment problem. The faculty who approved the curriculum are rarely around during the assessment cycle. No one goes back to review the assessment cycle. Curriculum review will be done at UCC, where all curricula are approved. Current assessment cycles are fragmented. The new group will oversee the assessment review and make recommendations to UCC, much like programs make recommendations to departments. There will be more faculty oversight due to UCC's size. The faculty is not giving up authority; curriculum approval will remain with the faculty through UCC
- Forsythe: The workgroup was a workgroup; it wasn't a committee. Those meetings were not open because they were not a committee. She had met with the Deans. There is misinformation. They have every intention of it being faculty-driven and shared with the faculty.
- Kondratieff: IF we make this change to the charter, then it will appear that the new General Education requirement is a done deal. Institutional memory is not a good argument for this new committee. Move to the table this until next semester
- Pruitt/Gross: Discussion about this motion is possible
- McKerrall: This information is a first reading, information only. The motion is out of order.
- Pruitt: This is a discussion to allow people to think more about the charter change
- Petkus: We are here to have a dialog and discussion that helps further things forward. It is not necessarily that the idea is bad. It is about the transparency and how people serve.
- Kondratieff: I move that we get the discussion open further
- McKerrall: Discussion before we voted. He is voting against this 1. The positions are not going to change, and further in May. 2. Rarely are our people invested in our governance. Committees are formed by volunteers, not elected.
- Gross: Hands 14 for 16 against There will be more opportunities in May on the 14<sup>th</sup>
