DRAMATURG'S NOTES

In 2020, the Corona virus hit in the most deadly global pandemic since 1918. Schools, workplaces, events, and even families were altered. Isolation was the norm. Connection and sense of community were how we were able to cope. While *Neighborhood 3* was first produced in 2009, the experience of the pandemic might make its message even be more relevant today.

Online games were one way that people, especially younger people, found to connect over lockdown. MMO RPGs (Massive Multiplayer Online Role–Play Games) were particularly popular. Taking inspiration from tabletop predecessors like Dungeons & Dragons, MMO RPGs had made their debut in the late 90's, and their popularly had blown up in the early 2000s with the release of games like World of Warcraft. Being able to play with people around the world had created new kinds of community that people could still participate in, even at the height of the pandemic. This meant that younger people who were regular gamers didn't always see a need for in–person connections. Meanwhile, older generations didn't always see online communities as "real" or as positive things.

In *Neighborhood 3*, it's this generational divide that keeps the characters isolated from one another. They're unable to communicate and recognize that there are many ways to be together. All of them are desperate to connect, but their unwillingness to see each other's perspective leaves them unable to. What does it mean to find yourself living with strangers who are also your family?
